PARTNERSHIP WORKING IN INVERNESS



On Monday 7 October, six Ambulance Technicians and Paramedics, along with two Paramedic Team Leaders from Inverness Ambulance Station, were welcomed to **Inverness Community Fire Station** by members of Green Watch. After a short welcome and introduction, the Watch gave an overview of what we do, focusing on how we train, equip and respond to road traffic collisions (RTC) followed by

a guided tour of the station and a detailed look at both a Rescue Pump and the Heavy Rescue Unit. After a refreshment break, a session was delivered exploring common hazards and risks found at the scene of an RTC.

Firefighters and Ambulance crews then worked together to tackle two practical extrication scenarios. The benefit of joint training was really highlighted in the exercises and the debriefs were very beneficial for everyone present

Feedback from the Scottish Ambulance Service staff was positive, with everyone taking something from the day. More joint training is planned for the future.

FAMILY AFFAIR AT FORTROSE COMMEMORATES JAMES BRAIDWOOD

Invited by James' great-great-great granddaughter, Diana Hamilton-Jones, the Service contingent was led by **Deputy Assistant Chief Officer David Farries** and included colleagues from Edinburgh, Inverness, local stations on the Black Isle and Work Place Chaplain, Christina McCrae.

The memorial service, which takes place annually, provided the perfect opportunity to reflect on the life of a true pioneer who established many firefighting principles that are just as relevant today as they were when they were established in the nineteenth century.

Thanks to all Service colleagues who took the time to come along and commemorate the 158th anniversary of James' death in the line of duty and to the parish for such a warm welcome.
