The Trustees present the annual report together with the audited financial statements for the year ended 5 April 2019.

ORGANISATION

MCR Pathways (MCR) is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation recognised by the Scottish Charity Regulator OSCR, registration number SC045816. It is governed by its constitution which was adopted on 20th July 2015.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

MCR Pathways delivers schools based mentoring and talent development programmes supporting those in or on the edges of the care system to realise their full potential through education. The initial project was set up in one school in 2007 and funded directly by the MCR Charitable Foundation and Iain MacRitchie. A commitment to extend to all secondary schools in Glasgow resulted in the registration of MCR Pathways (MCR) as an independent charity on the 20th July 2015.

The MCR programme now supports over 2,000 young people aged between 12 to 18 on a weekly basis with schools based staff, a central development team and dedicated volunteers. Last year saw the MCR model embedded and fully operational in every secondary school in Glasgow. In 2018/19 the programme was introduced to six new Local Authorities as part of a national expansion. With support from national and locally based organisations, third sector partners and local and national government, MCR is now operating in schools in Aberdeen, Aberdeenshire, Edinburgh, Glasgow, North Ayrshire, South Lanarkshire and West Dunbartonshire.

A key element of the expansion is the establishment of integrated and long term pioneering partnerships with each Council and school. These partnerships are based on a shared investment to get the MCR programme fully operational in each area and include an agreed time frame for the transfer of skills and knowledge (from MCR to the Councils). The objective is to sustain the MCR programme in the long term such that it becomes part of the fabric of the education system.

MCR's vision, mission and values guide its activities at all times

- > vision an equality of education outcomes, career opportunities and life chances for young people in or on the edges of the care system relative to any other young person.
- > mission providing schools based mentoring and Talent Taster opportunities for young people to find, grow and use their talents through education, learning and experience.
- > values exceptional and consistent levels of Motivation, Commitment and Resilience.

The MCR programme now has many different facets including transition support from primary school to secondary school; S1 and S2 group work as part of the curriculum; one to one relationship-based mentoring from S3 (underpinned by a detailed "matching" process undertaken with mentors and the young people); a menu of bite sized employment, college and university experiences in a Talent Taster programme; an Ambassadors programme; and a Next Steps community from S6 to support transitions to help sustain the chosen post school destination. Each facet is linked into MCR's vision, mission and values.

Relationship focused mentoring lies at the heart of the MCR programme. There is amazing potential and talent in all young people, regardless of their home life and circumstances. But for many, that potential has yet to be discovered. Life experience has knocked the confidence out of some, firmly locking away those seeds of aspiration and hope. It is our aim to uncover, nurture and develop the skills and capabilities of our young people and to bridge their talent with opportunity. MCR only recognises three distinct (but not mutually exclusive) positive Pathways for young people leaving school; namely progression to (1) further education, (2) higher education and/or (3) employment.

Given the positive and profound impact of the programme on all participants, other Councils have joined Glasgow City Council in a commitment to encourage and support their workforce to become MCR mentors as part of their working week. MCR remains actively supported by a number of key organisations including the Chambers of Commerce, Health & Social Care Partnerships, JP Morgan, Lloyds Banking Group, Newsquest, University of Strathclyde and Wheatley Group. In addition, MCR benefits from the commitment of long-term partners and funders in Life Changes Trust, MCR Charitable Foundation, the Robertson Trust and STV Children's Appeal. This group has been joined by the Scottish Innovation Partnership. Significant support has also been received from the Hugh Fraser Foundation, William Grant Foundation and the Children's Lottery.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The results for the current year reflect the conclusion of the citywide expansion in Glasgow and build up of the coverage across the country. In addition to the £893,234 costs incurred by MCR and reflected in these accounts, other parties incurred costs in excess of £1.4m on behalf of the project in the period to 5th April 2019 including MCR Holdings, Aberdeenshire Council, Aberdeen Council, Glasgow City Council and South Lanarkshire Council. Other parties including Wheatley Group have contributed seconded staff but not passed on any of these costs to MCR. Neither MCR Holdings nor any of the Councils noted were reimbursed the costs they incurred directly on behalf of the project.

In 2018/19 the continued development allowed MCR to double the number of young people participating in the programme, having done so in each of the two years previous. The expansion plan aims to double the number again to meet the needs of the young people identified.

One of the key indicators for mentored care-experienced young people is the number leaving school and going on to a positive destination i.e. sustainable destinations of college, university or employment.

With three years of impact data, from academic years 15/16 to 2017/18 83% of mentored, care-experienced young people achieved the aspirational MCR definition of positive destinations against a national average of 60%.

The figures for mentored, care-experienced young people attaining a full award in Maths and English at National Level 4 or above have remained consistently high with a three- year average figure of 72% as opposed to 34% of non-mentored care-experienced young people. Mentored care-experienced young people achieving a literacy and numeracy award at level 4 or above is even higher at 86%, significantly closing the gap on the 89% universal figure for all Glasgow young people.

We have maintained the dramatic improvement seen in previous years with 88% of mentored, care-experienced young people achieving five or more subjects at level 4 or above with only 46% of non-mentored young people achieving this target. Fuller details of levels of attainment may be found in our annual Impact Report.

Other notable successes in the year included:

- 45 Pathways Coordinators are now based in the schools which are part of the programme.
- \$1 and \$2 group work, conducted by the Pathways Coordinators in school, has been delivered to 861 young people giving them important life skills and assisting with literacy and numeracy.
- Almost 1,000 volunteer mentors supported the MCR programme by attending weekly 50 minute meetings with their assigned mentee.
- Over 39 different organisations offering Talent Taster experiences engaging 621 individual young people in 978 experiences
- 136 young people participated in the Duke of Edinburgh course achieving bronze, silver and gold awards.
- 94 young people participated in our Ambassadors programme (the voice of MCR young people) bringing together pupils from 24 of our secondary schools to inform and shape the development of the MCR programme.
- Recruitment of a Young People Engagement Coordinator to further develop our Next Steps programme to increase the post school support of our young people to sustain their positive destinations
- Further development of training courses for our volunteer mentors including a partnership with Strathclyde Business School offering a Leadership through MCR Mentoring course
- In February 2019 the launch of our Ripple Effect campaign. This helped to promote the MCR programme among a wider audience using existing contacts and social media links to spread the word

MCR's achievements in 2018/19 have been realised with the encouragement and support of numerous partners. These include our dedicated volunteer mentors, school headteachers and staff, Councils, organisations (local authorities, educational establishments, public bodies, private companies and local communities) who have encouraged volunteer

mentoring, and our various funders. All are committed to closing the attainment gap for our young people and in securing radical improvements in post school destinations. We thank all of them for their help.

MCR looks to the future with confidence and our key areas for upcoming activity include

- reaching a long term target figure of 5,000 young people being supported each week across Scotland
- double the number of Local Authorities in which MCR is operating and in particular in those with the greatest needs and that represent all the key environments in city, town, rural and island settings.
- inspire and recruit committed mentors from the public, private and education sectors to help the
 organisations meet corporate parent responsibilities but also to experience the social, economic and staff
 training benefits that are now being evidenced
- continue to build the training, support and programme management infrastructure and MCR team capacity and capability for a national footprint.
- continue our active participation in the Care Review and in particular to ensure the various groups of our young people feed directly into the process and conclusions
- further develop and deepen links with National and Local Government officers, elected members and Ministers to help align policies and practices to ensure that the outcomes for all country's careexperienced young people are determined by their talent and potential and never their circumstances.
- ensure all components of the MCR model are impact evidenced, fully documented and can be embedded and transferred into public ownership for long term sustainability.

VOLUNTEERS

The MCR Mentoring Programme is supported by our network of volunteer mentors. Our volunteer mentors meet with their matched young person for one school period per week.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The charity generated a net surplus of £5,942 for the year ended 5 April 2019 (2018: surplus £320,191).

At the Balance Sheet date reserves were £517,069 (2018: £511,127) with £517,069 of these being unrestricted (2018: £511,127). The expenditure levels of MCR are in line with expectations as we go through various expansion phases. The management and Trustees of MCR utilise tight financial controls to ensure that all funding raised is used for the benefit of the young people we support. No trustee received remuneration for their services to MCR.

RESERVES

It is the policy of MCR to maintain unrestricted funds, which are free reserves for the charity, at a level equivalent to twelve months expenditure. The Trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised.

Based on the accounts for the year ended 5 April 2019, ordinary expenditure for twelve months amounts to £893,234. At the Balance sheet date, the charity held unrestricted reserves of £517,069. This represents seven months funding and we will continue to improve on the reserve figure to achieve our goal of twelve months available funding.

RISK MANAGEMENT

MCR is not a risk averse organisation and it recognises that certain risks need to be taken if its programme is going to reach all relevant young people in Scotland. MCR invests in staff training and recognises the need to invest in its services while diversifying income sources to reduce dependence on any single stream of income.

MCR's long term objective is to ensure that its programme becomes embedded in the Scottish secondary education system, with all local authorities embracing the programme and dedicating resources to its continued success. There is risk associated with the maintenance and monitoring of the programme following its full adoption by government agencies and MCR is committed to managing this risk in order to secure the long term success of the programme.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

MCR is governed by a Board of Trustees. It is a single tier SCIO with all members being trustees.

As part of our expansion process, we have created a National Advisory Group, which includes some of Scotland's most experienced figures in business, the public sector, education and the third sector; Martin Armstrong, CEO of Wheatley; Sandy Begbie, Chief Transformation Officer, Tesco Bank; Professor Sir Harry Burns FRSE, University of Strathclyde; Kenneth Ferguson, Director of the Robertson Trust; David Hillier, Associate Principal and Executive Dean of the University of Strathclyde Business School; Alison MacLachlan UK Director of The Wood Foundation; Maureen McKenna, Director of Education at Glasgow City Council; Annemarie O'Donnell, CEO of Glasgow City Council; and Lena Wilson CBE, visiting Professor at the University of Strathclyde.

Day to day operation of MCR is delegated to a management team headed by lain MacRitchie.

APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

The Trustees seek to follow good practice and ensure that there is a broad and diverse mix of skills and experience within their number. The Trustees keep succession planning under review and when needed will seek to recruit new trustees based on their skill, experience and knowledge of the sector.

TRUSTEE INDUCTION PROCESS

On appointment, new trustees will be provided with a welcome pack including a history of the Trust, Trust Accounts, constitutional documents, a note on trustee duties and any other Codes of Conduct applicable at that time.

CONTROLS

The Board of Trustees is the governing body of MCR and is responsible for the charity's internal financial controls. The current system of controls aims to give the Board reasonable assurance that issues are identified as they arise and are dealt with in an effective and timely manner.

AUDITOR

It is the Trustees assessment that all necessary steps have been taken to ensure that the auditor has been made aware of all relevant audit information and as such there is no relevant audit information which the auditor has not been made aware of.

FUTURE PLANS

MCR Pathways intends to continue its expansion plans to get to the goal of supporting 5,000 young people. We will continue to market our model and engage in dialogue with additional local authorities to implement the MCR Pathways model throughout Scotland.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 5 April 2018



I. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to these financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with The Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Charities SORP (FRS 102) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective I January 2015)" and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical accounting convention.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Trust's ability to continue as a going concern.

Income Recognition

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, there is sufficient certainty of receipt and so it is probable that the income will be received, and that the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations to the Trust are recognised when they have been communicated to the Trust in writing containing both the amount and the settlement date.

Investment income is dealt with by reference to the due date of payment, Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Expenditure Recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Funds

The Trust maintains unrestricted funds which can be used in accordance with its charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Charitable Activities

Cost of charitable activities include grants and donations made and support costs, including governance costs.

Financial Instruments

The Charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities that qualify as basic financial instruments.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at settlement value.

Taxation

The Charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.
